The source of data used in this publication is "Allgemeine Bevölkerungsumfrage der Sozialwissenschaften" (ALLBUS) - German General Social Survey 1998. From 1980 to 1986 and in 1991, the ALLBUS program was funded by the DFG. For all other surveys, state and federal funding has been made available through GESIS (Gesellschaft sozialwissenschaftlicher Infrastruktureinrichtungen). Short Description of the ALLBUS / GGSS Project

The "German General Social Survey" (GGSS ("Allgemeine Bevölkerungsumfrage der Sozialwissenschaften" (ALLBUS))) was initiated as a joint project of ZUMA and Zentralarchiv in the mid-1970s. Its mission is to collect and disseminate high quality data for research and teaching in the social sciences. The core of its concept are repeated cross section surveys comprising a partly constant and partly varying program of questions which covers key areas of the social sciences.

The first four surveys of the years 1980, 1982, 1984 and 1986 have been funded through individual grants of the German Research Foundation (Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft (DFG)). DFG funding has also been made available for an additional survey in 1991. The aim of this so-called "Basisstudie" (Baseline Study) was to provide ALLBUS data covering the special situation immediately after the German unification.²

With the foundation of the "German Social Sciences Infrastructure Services" (Gesellschaft sozialwissenschaftlicher Infrastruktureinrichtungen (GESIS)) on 12 December 1986, ALLBUS has been included into the state-federal funding of the institutes united by GESIS and institutionalized as a joint-venture of the Centre for

Since 1980, commercial polling institutes were entrusted with the field-work of the nationwide surveys (see further comments on technical details of the survey in the ALLBUS surveydescription following below). Finally, it ought to be emphasized that, besides these institutions, many other social scientists have contributed significantly to ALLBUS by proposing questions and offering valuable advice.

The collection and preparation of ALLBUS data for a broad scope of social sciences has three key intents:

- to investigate current social structures, attitudes and behavior in Germany
- to monitor social change over long time
- to supply those scientists and students who have no immediate personal access to empirical materials with easily obtainable, high quality data.

Today, ALLBUS is an easily available and well documented source of data for research and teaching in the social sciences. A large part of the questions have already been tested in various previous surveys. If earlier questionnaires and publications could not show satisfying questions for certain areas of investigation, modified or new items have been developed specifically for ALLBUS.

Acceptance of ALLBUS within the scientific community is widespread and reaches beyond national boundaries. Ever since the first ALLBUS survey in 1980, this series has been among the most requested data of the Central Archive for Empirical Social Research. As in a number of other countries, notably in the United Kingdom with the "British Social Attitudes" (BSA), in Poland with the "Polish General Social Survey" (PGSS), and in Japan with the "Japanese General Social Survey" (JGSS), the institutionalization of social monitoring comparable to the U.S. "General Social Survey" (GSS) has been successful.4

Information for Analyses: Sampling Design and Weighting in the ALLBUS Surveys

All ALLBUS samples are multi-stage stratified random samples, but they differ in design and in the way of selection or targeting units.

In the early ALLBUS surveys the targeted sampling unit is a household. In this case, the probability of selection is the same for all households in the universe sampled. However, the probability of selection for individual persons living in one of these households varies with the number of household members. The ALLBUS surveys between 1980 and 1992, and ALLBUS 1998 used a sampling method based on the ADM-design, in which a sample of households was selected in a three stage sampling procedure: In the first stage, a sample of electoral districts was selected. In the second stage, the interviewers selected the appropriate households in the electoral district starting at an address chosen at random and then proceeding through the area following rules specified before. In the third stage, the interviewers finally chose the household member to be interviewed using an additional random scheme (Kish-Selection-Grid).⁵

In the years **1994**, **1996** and since **2000**, the ALLBUS surveys used a two stage random sample of individuals. First, a random sample of municipalities was selected. In the second stage, addresses of individuals were then selected at random from the municipal registers of residents.⁶ Compared to the ADM-method of sampling, which

is widely used in Germany, this procedure promises some advantages regarding not only the sample plan and the fieldwork but also the accuracy of some results.⁷

Both the ADM-design and the sampling method using municipal registers of residents provide representative samples of the population of the Federal Republic of Germany. However, there is a difference in the selection probability of the sampled units. If the targeted sampling unit is a known individual, respondents have an a priori identical probability of selection. Therefore, the **sample of individuals** drawn from the municipal registers of residence needs no weighting for analyses targeting the individual level.

For the ADM-design, on the other hand, it is the **households** chosen for interviewing which in theory have the same probability of selection. For the individuals living at a specific address, the probability of selection also depends on the respective numbers of household members belonging to the universe sampled: Ceteris paribus, the larger the number of household members who are eligible to be interviewed, the smaller the chance for a particular person in the household to be finally chosen for the interview, as only one person per contact address is interviewed. This number of household members eligible to be sampled is also referred to as the "reduced household size." In principle, all analyses on the level of individuals of data from ALLBUS surveys using a household sample, like ALLBUS 1998, therefore have to be weighted proportionally to the reduced size of household (transformation weight).

However, it has been noted that in the daily practice of research the use of transformation weights is often neglected. This is unproblematic as long as weighted and unweighted results differ only slightly or not at all. Generally speaking, the strength of the weighting effect depends on the strength of the correlation between the object of interest in the analysis and the reduced size of household. If the correlation is weak, using the transformation weight will only slightly affect the analysis. If the correlation is strong, however, weighting will lead to a more substantial difference between weighted and unweighted results. Moreover, the transformation weight is often rejected, because the observed "reduced household size" may in itself be biased by

dysfunctional impediments in the sampling process. One example is the difficulty of contacting respondents who are living alone in a household, which leads to a possible underrepresentation of these individuals. This is an effect, inherent in the praxis of the ADM-design, which counters the theoretically higher selection probability of individuals living in smaller households.⁸

Given these circumstances, all analyses targeting individuals but using household samples should be performed both weighted and unweighted in order to proceed with greatest care. Results should then be checked carefully to determine the influence of weighting.

Investigators should also be aware of the disproportionate number of respondents from the *new and old federal states* included in the ALLBUS-sample since 1991. Numerous analyses have shown that there are still substantial differences between the old and the new federal states. Therefore, it is often appropriate to do separate analyses for these sections of Germany. In order to allow meaningful analyses of social groups in the eastern sub-sample, respondents from the area of the new federal states were oversampled, i.e. more people were interviewed than would have been fitting given their actual proportion of the total population. For simple inspection of marginals, separate percentage counts for East and West Germany have already been integrated into the following variable-descriptions. On the other hand, in order to carry out analyses immediately representative of Germany as a whole, i.e. without separating between old and new federal states, the data must first be weighted. Appropriate East-West-weights are already included in the ALLBUS data sets. Topics:

- 1.) Economic situation and anticipation of occupational risks: assessments of the present and future economic situation in Germany; assessment of present and future personal economic situation; fear of unemployment or loss of business.
- 2.) *Importance of life aspects:* family and children, occupation and work, free time and recreation, friends and acquaintances, kinship, religion and church, politics and public life, neighborhood.
- 3.) Free time activities, personal manner, and lifestyle: reading books; reading magazines; listening to records, CD's, cassettes; watching videos; using the computer; surfing the internet;

private further education; relaxing, being lazy; walking or hiking; yoga, meditation; going to restaurants; visiting friends; visiting relatives; playing games; taking short trips; participating in politics; voluntary activities or honorary offices; attending church or religious events; indulging in art and music; do it yourself; active sport; attending sports events; going to the cinema, to pop concerts, jazz or dance events; classic culture (i.e. opera, classical concerts, theater, exhibitions); preference for folk music (i.e. Volksmusik), German pop songs or rock music, classical music, jazz.

4.) Use and assessment of media: type of television reception device (satellite dish, cable, television aerial), amount of time spent using the media (frequency of radio and television use over the week, amount of time per day spent watching TV or listening to the radio in minutes). Taste in television programs: shows or quiz programs, sports, movies, news broadcasts, political magazines, art and culture programs, traditional German "Heimat"-films, detective films, action films, sitcom or entertainment series; frequency of reading the daily newspaper per week; sections of interest (i.e. politics, business, culture, sport, local, international, advertisements or classified advertisements).

Number of periodicals read regularly; titles of regularly-read periodicals; assessment of credibility of each type of media; preferred sources of information on political events (i.e. newspaper, television or conversations).

5.) *Political participation:* articulation of one's own opinion, voting, public discussion, citizens' initiatives, party work, support of political candidates, demonstrations, house squatting, personal violence, intimidation of opponents, abstinence from voting or casting a protest vote for another party, collecting signatures, blocking traffic (each of these activities were repeatedly raised with respect to the following (1) whether respondent had a role in an activity concerning an important issue, (2) whether respondent had been a participant in earlier activities, (3) whether respondent had been recently active (since the beginning of 1996), (4) whether the action was seen as politically effective (slightly shortened list)).

Voting behavior in the past: respondent's eligibility to vote and participation in German state elections (Landtagswahl); eligibility to vote and participation in the European elections; eligibility to vote and participation in last federal elections; recall of vote in last federal elections.

Perception of possible influence on politics (political efficacy, political alienation); gap between politicians and citizens; self-assuredness in relation to political group work; perceived influence on governmental policies; too much complexity in politics; the politicians' closeness to constituents.

Norms for political participation: discontent as motivation for engagement; belief in effectiveness as motivation for engagement; let the elected representatives handle politics; participation in the vote as a civic duty; moral acceptability of violence; plebiscite as a necessary component of democracy; establishing democracy in all social areas.

Political participation in peer group; criticism of political situation; political activity.

6.) Attitudes towards politics and social inequality: political support (satisfaction with democracy in Germany); satisfaction with the performance of the federal government; national pride; satisfaction with life in the Federal Republic of Germany.

Statements on the legitimacy of social inequality: Inequality of income as incentive to achieve; acceptability of differences in status; justness of social differences.

Political interest; self-placement on a left-right continuum; self-assessment of social class; postmaterialism (importance of law and order, fighting rising prices, free expression of opinions,

and influence on governmental decisions); concerns about social issues in Germany (environmental protection, the number of immigrants, the costs of German unification, the development of crime figures, unemployment); perceived representation of personal interests through organizations: trade unions, Catholic and Protestant churches, ecological or environmental organizations, CDU, CSU, SPD, FDP, The Greens (Bündnis 90/Die Grünen), Republikaner, PDS.

- 7.) Attitudes relating to the process of German unification: demand for increased willingness to make sacrifices in the West and for more patience in the East; more advantages for East or West through German unification; the future in the East depends on the willingness of eastern Germans to make an effort; strangeness of citizens in the other part of Germany; pressures to work harder in the East; attitudes towards the Stasi-past of individuals; evaluation of socialism as an idea.
- 8.) ALLBUS-Demography: Details about the respondent: gender; month and year of birth, age; geographical origin and citizenship; place of residence (federal state, administrative district, size of municipality, BIK-type of municipality) and length of residence; religious denomination, frequency of church attendance; voting intention (Sonntagsfrage); school education, vocational training; employment status; details about current occupation, affiliation to public service, supervisory functions, working hours per week; length of unemployment; date of termination of full- or part-time employment; details about former occupation; respondent's income; marital status.

Details about respondent's current spouse: school education, vocational training; employment status; details about current occupation.

Details about respondent's steady extra-marital partner: common household; month and year of birth, age; school education, vocational training; employment status; details about current occupation.

Details about respondent's parents: school education of father and mother; father's occupation. Description of household: size of household; number of persons older than 17 in household (reduced size of household); household income; type of dwelling; telephone, listing in telephone directory.

Details about household members: relation to respondent; gender; month and year of birth, age; marital status.

Respondent's current memberships (Deutscher Gewerkschaftsbund (DGB) <German Confederation of Trade Unions>, Deutsche Angestelltengewerkschaft (DAG) <German Salaried Employees' Trade Union>, Christlicher Gewerkschaftsbund (CGB) <Christian Federation of Trade Unions>, Union Leitender Angestellter (ULA) <Association of Executive Staff>, Deutscher Beamtenbund (DBB) <German Civil Service Federation>, Deutscher Bauernverband <German Farmers Association>, trade association, Bundesverband der Deutschen Industrie (BDI) <Federation of German Industries>, association of a liberal profession, other occupational association); respondent's current and former memberships (choral society, sports club, leisure activity club, local citizens club or community club, other social association, association of German expellees or refugees, charitable association, religious/church organization, youth or student organization, political party, citizens' initiative, environmentalist or alternative political group, other club or association).

9.) Data on the interview: beginning and end of interview; date of interview; length of interview; presence of other people during the interview (spouse, partner, children, relatives, other

persons); interference of other people in the interview; willingness of respondent to cooperate; reliability of respondent's statements.

Serial number of sample net, sample point and within sample point; number of interview for interviewer; number of interview for sample point; reachability of respondent; willingness of respondent to cooperate.

Data on the interviewer: gender, age, school education, identification of interviewer.

10.) Derived indices: Inglehart-index; family typology, classification of private households (according to Porst and Funk); International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO 1968, 1988); occupational prestige (according to Treiman); magnitude prestige (according to Wegener); occupational meta-classification (according to Terwey); class position (according to Goldthorpe); weights.

Total Population and Sample:

Universe sampled: Federal Republic of Germany

Household sample: Multi-stage random sample of private households in the new and old states addressing all German speaking individuals who were at least 18 years of age by the day of the interview. The selection of private households was based on the ADM-Master-Design with following random-route. Respondents from the area of the new federal states are oversampled so that analysts can obtain a more detailed picture of this portion of the population.

Further Notes:

Respondents from the area of the new federal states are oversampled so that analysts can obtain a more detailed picture of this portion of the population. In 1998 the German ISSP was not combined with ALLBUS. Therefore, the German ISSP data set 1998 has different respondents from ALLBUS 1998. It can be obtained as a separate study from the Central Archive (ZA No. 3080).

A second version of this data set with a shortened demography module is additionally available as ALLBUScompact 1998 (ZA No. 3754).

The original German data sets are available as ZA No. 3000 (ALLBUS 1998) and ZA No. 3719 (ALLBUScompact 1998).

Inglehart-Index

This note concerns variable V174.

This index has been designed by Robert Inglehart to measure 'materialist' and 'postmaterialist' value orientations. It is based on the respondents' statements about their political priorities as given in V170 to V173.

Respondents who rank 'maintaining law and order in this country' as well as 'fighting rising prices' as the two most important issues are classified as 'materialists'. Respondents who consider 'giving citizens more influence on government decisions' and 'protecting the right of free speech' as the two most important goals are categorized as 'postmaterialists'.

All other respondents show ambiguous priorities in terms of this index and are therefore classified as 'mixed types'. The number of categories for these 'mixed types' can vary. In V111 two such 'mixed types' are differentiated. Respondents who rank a 'postmaterialist' item first and a 'materialist' item second are grouped into the category 'postmaterialist mixed type', while the reverse order of preferences is assigned to the 'materialist mixed type'.

However, if a missing value occurs in one of the two political preferences relevant for index construction, the index is set to the corresponding missing value, as it is impossible to construct the index according to its own logic in this case.

The class scheme by Goldthorpe groups individuals on the basis of their occupational position (reference number) and their occupational function (using ISCO 1968). By combining these two variables, 12 different class categories are then constituted.

In contrast to the coding of the Goldthorpe class scheme in the first ALLBUS data sets, a special code (12) for 'farmer on a cooperative farm' has been introduced. In order to ensure comparability with previous ALLBUS-surveys, data from previous studies should be modified in the following way: Respondents who identify their 'current occupational position' as 'farmer on a cooperative farm' (code 14 or 65) should be recoded to code 12 in the Goldthorpe class scheme.

In contrast to an 'hierarchical' scale, based for instance on prestige and status, the Goldthorpe index is rather oriented towards a nominal concept of class structure. This makes it especially useful in analyzing, for example, the development of industrial societies into service societies, because the categories of the Goldthorpe class scheme allow a more precise analysis and description of the growth or decline of different parts of the middle classes or of various groups of dependent employees and civil servants than scales which consist of horizontally differentiated ordinal status or prestige measures.

Moreover, the Goldthorpe class scheme in its present form is especially suitable for internationally comparative analyses (e.g. analyses of social mobility).

Spouse's Certificate of Vocational or Professional Training

Variable V320 contains a summary of the responses to V318 (open question) and V319 (pre-quoted categories). For each of the listed categories in V319 the mid-point of class entered into the summary. The lowest income category 'Under DM 400' received the value 300 DM, while the highest open category of 'DM 15,000 and over' was coded as 17,500 DM.

Variable V321 contains a categorization of variable V417.

Household income

V376 (open question) and V377 (pre-quoted categories) are based on the information about the income of multiple-person households in V374 and V375. For one-person households, income data from V318 and V319 (respondent's income) was added, as the income of these households is identical with the respondent's income.

V378 is a proposal for the summary of the diverse information on household income. This variable integrates all the data gathered using open questions as well as lists of pre-quoted categories. For each of the listed categories the mid-point of class entered into the summary. The open categories at the beginning ('Under 400 DM') and the end ('DM 15,000 and over') of the list were coded as DM 300 and DM 17,500 respectively.

Variable V379 contains a categorization of V387.

Membership in Professional Organizations

This note concerns variables V385 to V394.

In these variables the respondents were asked about their memberships in professional organizations. Multiple responses were permitted. In the data file, this battery of items is stored in separate dummy variables. In order to provide a better overview, the responses are summarized here.

What Number of Interview for Interviewer (Per Sample Point)?

This note concerns variables V445 and V446.

Variable V445 contains information on the sequence of the interviews conducted by the interviewer. In variable V446 the sample point is also specified. Together these variables document the sequence of interviews per point and interviewer.

Information about the sequence of interviews was derived from the date and time recorded for each interview. If a date was specified but not a time, an average was used to calculate the sequence of the interviews conducted by the interviewer.

Political Size of Municipality and BIK-Type of Municipality

This note concerns variables V459 and V460.

Size of Municipality (V459) categorizes the respondents' places of residence according to their number of inhabitants. In order to take care of data protection uncategorized data of this kind cannot be published. Categorization of respondents' places of residence is based on information about their size as political/administrative units.

Since the 'Boustedt-type of municipality' had last been established with the census data of 1970 and no equivalent taxonomy was available for the area of the new federal states in East Germany, a revision of the concept of Boustedt-municipalities seemed in order. Based on data from the 1987 census, the BIK-Institute Aschpurwis + Behrens therefore developed a revised taxonomy of urban regions for the area of the old federal states (West Germany) - the BIK-type of municipalities and regions (V460) - that takes into account the changes in residential patterns over the last 20 years. Compared to the older Boustedt-system, the indicators used to delimit classes have been revised extensively for this new taxonomy. For the area of the new federal states in East Germany, classification into BIK-types of municipalities and regions followed the same principles as for West Germany. However, due to a lack of comparable data, classification proceeded from a different and partly reduced database. Similar to the Boustedt-classification, categorization into BIK-regions is based on the number of residents (the sum of zones 1 to 3). Outside these urban regions, classification was based on the respective municipality's number of residents (categories 1 to 4).

Metaclassification of Occupations

This note concerns variables V461 to V467.

For those respondents who are not in the labor force, the metaclassification of occupations allows an indirect occupational classification, e.g. according to the profession or occupation of the respondent's spouse or father. Thus, the purpose of the metaclassification is to arrive at a description of the social circumstance and social positions of otherwise unclassifiable respondents by (indirectly) linking them to positions in the occupational system in a principled way.

Pappi (1979) points out that there are several conceivable ways of conducting a metaclassification of occupations. As an alternative to Pappi's rather male-centered operationalization (e.g. married women are classified according to their husbands' occupation), Michael Terwey has developed a less male-centered variable. This more recent classification takes into account that in our present society the individual's personal circumstance increasingly determines its social position.

The construction of Terwey's metaclassification proceeds in the following steps:

- 1) All respondents who are employed full-time or part-time are classified according to their own current occupation.
- All persons who were formerly employed full-time or part-time are categorized according to their last occupational status.
- 3) Only those married women and men who themselves have never been employed before are classified according to their spouses' occupation. If the spouse is a pupil/student, a housewife/househusband or doing compulsory military/ alternative community service, classification is based on the father's occupation. For former ALLBUS-surveys the spouse's last occupation was used for categorization if the spouse was retired, unemployed or out of work for other reasons. As this information is not available in ALLBUS 1996, these cases are coded as not classifiable.
- 4) In former ALLBUS-surveys, respondents who were widowed, divorced or living in separation and who had never been employed themselves, were categorized according to their previous spouse's occupation. As this information is not available in ALLBUS 1996, these cases are coded as not classifiable.
- 5) All unmarried respondents who have never been employed themselves are categorized using their father's occupation.
- 6) Insofar as they cannot be considered full-time or parttime employed in the sense of this metaclassification,
 respondents in compulsory military or alternative community
 service and those in vocational training represent a
 general exception. For these and for all other respondents
 who have no identifiable main occupation, the nearest
 possible occupational position is used. Married respondents
 in this group are, for example, categorized according
 to their spouses' current occupation or, if this is
 impossible, according to their fathers' occupation.

If a missing value ('Inadequately described occupation', 'Refused', 'Don't know' or 'No answer') appears within an occupation code relevant for metaclassification or if, for any other reason, occupational information does not permit a meta-classification according to a main occupation, the case is also coded as not classifiable.

The metaclassification of occupations according to Pappi is not included in ALLBUS 1998, since, due to cuts in the ALLBUS demography module, the necessary information is no longer available for a relevant part of the sample (see also the methodological report for ALLBUS 1994).

Household Classification, Detailed; Household Classification, Condensed; Family Typology According to Porst (1984)

Household and family structures are relevant subjects of empirical sociological research for political, sociological and methodological reasons (cf. Porst 1984). Using an SPSS-program (comp. Funk 1989), suitable data has been extracted from the ALLBUS-household-demographics to form two household classifications, one detailed and one condensed, as well as a family typology. Together, these three typologies map the variety of family types and household compositions, thus forming a basis for further structural analysis.

The condensed household classification differentiates between one-person households, one- to four-generation-households, households of relatives with and without a family core - i.e. households with at least one member related to the others by kinship yet outside the line of descent - and between cohabiting communities with and without a family core. As relevant microstructures within these nine basic types of household, the detailed household classification distinguishes various combinations of kinship relations and the respondent's position within the context of the household (e.g. the detailed classification of households differentiates between married and cohabiting couples in one-generation-households and between two-generation-households in which the respondent takes the role of child and those in which the respondent takes the role of parent).

As an extension of the household-classifications, the family typology identifies nuclear families, two- to fourgeneration-families (in all cases differentiating complete and incomplete families), extended families (i.e. households of relatives with a family core) and composite families (i.e. cohabiting communities with a family core).

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Appendix

Notes on the Additional ALLBUS / GGSScompact 1998 (ZA No. 3754)

As an alternative to ALLBUS / GGSS 1998 with its relatively complex demography module, ZA also offers an additional compact version with a reduced number of demographic variables. Providing an easily manageable selection of basic demographic descriptors, this ALLBUS / GGSScompact addresses, amongst others, the needs of newcomers to data analysis. Moreover, access conditions for ALLBUS / GGSScompact are less strict than for the more extensive ALLBUS / GGSS data, because data protection issues become less salient.

However, for reasons of data protection some of the remaining demographic data still had to be simplified. When part of the ALLBUS / GGSS survey in question, detailed data concerning the respondents' citizenship has been dichotomized ("German citizenship" vs. "No German citizenship"). The information on the respondents' occupational position has been recoded into more inclusive categories. Finally, the two largest categories of the variable 'Political Size of Municipality' have been combined. (A detailed account of recodings follows on page A3.)

Apart from demography, all other questions have been retained completely in the compact version. Moreover, variable labels and variable numbers in ALLBUS / GGSScompact are the same as in the unabridged ALLBUS / GGSS data set. In this way, users may easily move between both versions of the ALLBUS / GGSS data if necessary.
