# German General Social Survey: A National Data Generation Program 

Michael Terwey

In the mid 1970s, the "German General Social Survey (GGSS)" (original title: "Allgemeine Bevölkerungsumfrage der Sozialwissenschaften (ALLBUS)") was initiated as a joint project of the Centre for Survey Research and Methodology (ZUMA - Zentrum für Umfragen, Methoden und Analysen, Mannheim) and the Central Archive for Empirical Social Research (ZA - Zentralarchiv für Empirische Sozialforschung, Cologne). ${ }^{1}$ Its mission is to collect and disseminate high quality data for research and teaching in the social sciences. The core of its concept are repeated cross-sectional surveys comprising a partly constant and partly varying program of questions which covers key areas of the social sciences.

The first four surveys of the years 1980, 1982, 1984 and 1986 were funded through individual grants of the German Research Foundation (Deutsche Forschungsgemeinschaft (DFG)). ${ }^{2}$ DFG funding was also made available for an additional survey in 1991. The aim of this so-called "Basisumfrage" (Baseline Study) was to provide ALLBUS data covering the special situation immediately after the German unification. ${ }^{3}$

With the foundation of GESIS in 1986, ALLBUS was established as a section of ZUMA (Mannheim) and as a workgroup within ZA (Cologne). In this way, ALLBUS was henceforth included in the state-federal funding of the institutes united within GESIS. Simultaneously,

Since 1980, commercial polling institutes acting on behalf of ALLBUS have been entrusted with the fieldwork of the nationwide surveys (see further comments on technical details of the surveys in the ALLBUS/GGSS survey description following below and in the methodological reports).

Finally, it should be emphasized that, in addition to the institutional ALLBUS contributors, many other social scientists have contributed significantly to ALLBUS by proposing questions and offering valuable advice.

The collection and preparation of ALLBUS data for the social sciences in general has three main goals:

- to investigate current social structures, attitudes, values and behavior in Germany
- to monitor social change over long time periods
- to supply those persons who have no immediate personal access to empirical materials with easily accessible, high quality data.

Today, ALLBUS is an easily available and well documented source of data for research and teaching in the social sciences. A large part of the items have been tested in various previous surveys. If earlier research did not show adequate questions for specific subjects areas of investigation, modified or new items have been developed specifically for ALLBUS.

Acceptance of ALLBUS within the scientific community is widespread and reaches beyond national boundaries. Ever since the first ALLBUS survey in 1980, this series has been among the most requested data held in the GESIS archives. Figure 1 reveals an overview of the development of the number of registered requests for data and documentation in the first 12 years of the program.


Figure 1: Counts of ALLBUS/GGSS usage from 1980 to 1991 registered by the Central Archive for Empirical Social Research (Source: Own calculations as of 2006-12-15)

Since 1980, the numbers illustrated in Figure 1 show a general trend towards an increasing usage. The consistently higher distribution numbers for codebooks as compared to data sets is due to a number of reasons. Firstly, many research questions can be worked on using the extensive documentation of the data in the codebooks alone. Secondly, in the 1980s not all users had the technical means or the expertise to utilize the data in computerized data analysis. Finally, no thorough analysis of ALLBUS data can be done without reference to the full documentation as available in the codebooks. From 1983 on, we notice higher demands in the individual years following each survey. The main cause for this observation is that after preparation and documentation data service usually started distribution of the latest ALLBUS surveys in these years.

The first releases of ALLBUS in cumulation files only played a minor role, because until then there was only a relatively low number of replicated ALLBUS variables to be cumulated. Moreover, these early versions did not yet have some of the value-additions which could be put into service later on (cf. Terwey 1990, 2006; Terwey and Baumann 2008).

The distribution numbers in Figure 1 may not seem very high. However, one has to bear in mind that in the 1980s the use of survey data was generally restricted to a fairly narrow circle of individual researchers and institutions (e.g. university institutes, research projects, etc.). As a rule, codebooks were then mostly distributed as bound volumes, which were expensive to produce. Therefore a relatively high fee became necessary. The data sets themselves were mostly transferred to comparatively unwieldy magnetic tapes. These tapes were thereupon used on traditional main frame computers in local computing centers allowing researchers with proper access to analyze their data in a time-sharing system. Accordingly, the majority of data sets distributed till 1990 (1990: 43 of 68 ) were copied to magnetic tape. Afterwards together with a notable increase in registered users the role of magnetic tape as distribution medium started to decline while the institutional demand for ALLBUS data (e.g. from procurement entities of universities) gradually decreased in favor of direct orders by individuals (cf. also Terwey 1998). Before turning to more recent distribution numbers, however, it seems appropriate to add that already in the period from 1980 to 1991 and under the circumstances outlined above ALLBUS has been the most requested survey in the archival service at Cologne. Moreover, considering all measuring points between 1980 and 1991 a clear augmentation is discernible, which is slightly more noticeable after the release of ALLBUS 1988 in 1989.

Then again, changes in the dissemination procedures, growing demand, and an increasing diversity of ALLBUS-materials distributed after 1991 make the variation shown in Figure 1 look tiny after integrating this first period into Figure 2.

Between 1992 and 1997 a growing dissemination of individual materials was going along with the introduction of floppy-discs. CD-ROMs as a new medium from 1996 on started another, major change in the distribution of ALLBUS-materials. As a rule, ALLBUS CDROMS offer a comprehensive collection of all ALLBUS materials available at the date of their release. Of course, these CD-ROM collections are regularly updated, which also means that the number of surveys and files per collection release has been steadily growing over time. So far, distribution numbers for CD-ROMS first peaked in 2001 at 250 CD-ROMS spreading a total of about 3000 data and documentation files (cf. Terwey 2002). Besides, the pilot introduction of a free download for two ALLBUS surveys (ALLBUS 1994 and 1996) in 2000 started a development on the internet, which later on surpassed even registered diffusion via CD-ROM collections. In the first year of this pilot project the registered distribution of individual data sets and of other materials more than doubled the previously highest figures reaching more than 1000 downloads of data and documentation. Although these figures dropped during the two following years, because the available materials lost some attractiveness as time went by, the counts of distributed files stayed well above the figures for the 1980s and early 1990s showing the future potential of this novel form of distribution for gaining a widening reservoir of ALLBUS users. While the subsequent implementation of free-of-charge download platforms for the ALLBUS full version and the
additional series ALLBUScompact in 2003 may have contributed to diminished quantities of files distributed via CD-ROM, the total delivery of ALLBUS materials nevertheless led to a previously unimagined growth of supply and demand.

With the institution of ALLBUS, an instrument of social monitoring comparable to the U.S. "General Social Survey (GSS)" (Davis et al. 2005; GSS 2006) has been successfully established in Germany. Similar programs today also exist in a number of other countries notably in the United Kingdom with the "British Social Attitudes (BSA)" (Brook et al. 1992; BSA 2006), in Poland with the "Polish General Social Survey (PGSS)" (Cichomski et al. 2003; PGSS 2006) and in Japan with the "Japanese General Social Survey (JGSS)" (cf. also: Scottish Social Attitudes Survey (SSA 2006); The Australian Survey of Social Attitudes (AuSSA 2006)).

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# Basic Sample Designs and Weighting

Working with ALLBUS data, we should be aware of the fact that since 1991 the ALLBUSsample contains a disproportionate number of respondents from the formerly communist eastern part of Germany. Numerous analyses have shown that there are still substantial differences between these new federal states and the region of the old Bundesrepublik (FRG). Therefore separate analyses for these two areas of unified Germany often appear to be appropriate. In order to enable more reliable analyses of subgroups in the eastern sample, ALLBUS uses a disproportionate design oversampling respondents from the area of the new federal states (i.e. more people are interviewed in East Germany than would be appropriate given its actual proportion of the total population).

Most variable documentations in this ALLBUS data handbook already include cross tabulations showing separate percentage counts for East and West as a supplement to the total frequency counts. These cross tabulations can be analyzed without adjusting for the East German oversample. If, however, your investigation aims at making a statement about total Germany, the data have to be weighted first. For this purpose an East-West weight is provided with the data set (V735). Moreover, as an enhancement over the previous ALLBUS documentation, the new data handbook introduces properly weighted frequency counts for total Germany as a regular feature of most variable descriptions. Because the data has been adjusted for the oversample, these marginal distributions can be interpreted as representative of total Germany. ${ }^{5}$

A little more complicated task lies in the use of transformation weights to transfer household samples into samples of individuals and vice versa.

From 1980 to 1992 and again in 1998, the ALLBUS interviewers used a sampling method based on the ADM-design. In the first stage of this three-stage sampling procedure, a sample of electoral districts was selected. In the second stage the interviewers selected a target household in the electoral district, starting at a randomly chosen address and then proceeding through the area following specified rules. In the third stage, random digits (Kish-Selection-Grid) were finally used to determine the household member to be interviewed (cf. Kirschner 1984; ADM and AG.MA 1999).

[^2]Thus, in the case of the ADM-sampling-design it is the households within the universe sampled which have the same probability of selection. For the individual persons living at a specific address, the probability of selection also depends on the respective number of household members belonging to the universe sampled.

Persons living in large households are less likely to be interviewed, as only one interview is to be done at each selected household. The larger the number of household members which are eligible to be interviewed, the smaller the chance for a particular person in the household to be finally chosen for the interview. The simplest way to compensate for this is to weight each given interview proportionally to the number of eligible respondents in the household where the interview was conducted. Accordingly, all individual-level analyses of data from ALLBUS surveys using a household sample, i.e. ALLBUS 1980 to ALLBUS 1992 and ALLBUS 1998, therefore have to be weighted proportionally to the number of household members belonging to the universe sampled (transformation weight).

In the daily practice of research transformation weights are nevertheless rarely used. Usually, this is unproblematic because for the most part weighted and unweighted results differ only slightly or not at all. Generally speaking, the strength of the weighting effect depends on the strength of the correlation between the object of interest in the analysis and the size of the household. If the correlation is weak, using the transformation weight will only slightly affect the analysis. If the correlation is strong, however, weighting will lead to a more substantial difference between weighted and unweighted results. Thus, the safest procedure when performing individual-level analyses with data from household samples (1980-1992, 1998) is to perform both weighted and unweighted analyses. Results should then be checked carefully to determine the influence of weighting.

In contrast to earlier mentioned ALLBUS samples, the surveys in 1994, 1996 and from 2000 on have all been produced in a two stage random sampling design yielding as sampled units individual persons rather than households. In the first stage, a random sample of municipalities was selected. In the second stage, addresses of individuals were selected at random from the municipal registers of residents. Compared to the ADM-method of sampling, this procedure promises some advantages regarding not only the sample design and the fieldwork but also the accuracy of some results (cf. ADM and AG.MA 1999, Blohm 2006, Holst 2006, Koch 1997, Koch et al. 1994, and Table 1). As this more sophisticated and more costly sampling method would have exceeded the budget for the 1998 survey, ALLBUS 1998 was again conducted using the ADM-design (with interviewers working through lists of contact addresses which were pre-selected by random route (cf. ADM and AG.MA 1999 and Holst 2006)).

Both the ADM-design and the design using municipal registers of residents theoretically provide representative samples of the target population. The two methods differ, however, in the selection probability of the sampled units. If the targeted sampling unit is a known individual, respondents have an a priori identical probability of selection. Therefore, the

## sample of individuals drawn from the municipal registers of residence needs no weighting for analyses targeting the individual level (cf. Bens 2006; Blohm 2006: 40).

On the other hand, it has to be added that weighted data can in some cases deviate more from official census data than unweighted data. The reason for this is that in surveys using the ADM-design the observed size of households can itself be biased because of the sampling procedures. One pertinent example is the representation of one-person households. In theory, respondents living in one-person households should be overrepresented in samples using the ADM-design because of the a priori higher selection probability of individuals living in smaller households. In reality, however, difficulties in contacting respondents, who are living alone, outdo their theoretical advantage in the selection process, leading de facto more or less to an underrepresention (cf. Hartmann and Schimpl-Neimanns 1992).

Table 1 shows some examples of various possible weighting effects. ALLBUS data from 1992 (household sample) are compared to data from the 1991 Microcensus and from ALLBUS 1994 (sample of individuals). Transformation weighting has little effect on all of the listed attitudinal items in the table: Assessment of personal economic situation, political interest, Inglehart-Index, and assessment of socialism. A different result occurs among some of the demographic variables. Weighting has only little effect on the estimated proportions of men, of respondents with less than 10 years schooling, and of workers in the ALLBUS/GGSS-samples. In contrast, the percentages for older age groups (70 and older), for married respondents, for persons living in their own house, and especially for respondents living alone show a stronger effect of weighting. This supports the assumption that all of these characteristics are in some way statistically connected with the various household sizes. As further comparison shows, at least some of the results which change after transformation weighting also display a larger deviation from the Microcensus data. The accuracy of the sample of individuals is proven, by a larger part of the 1994 results deviating little from the respective references in Microcensus.

Finally, while household samples are not necessarily straightforwardly representative on the individual-level, it is, on the other hand, mostly inappropriate to draw statements about households from a sample of individuals without applying an appropriate transformation weight. However, transformation of one sample type to another is usually required less frequently. Nevertheless, whenever attributes of households - like number of residents, household income, family typology or household classification - are concerned, it is strongly recommended to apply the proper transformation weights (cf. Bens 2006). Both types of transformation weights are currently available for all surveys in the ALLBUS-cumulation.

Table 2 contains an exemplary comparison of categorized household income data from ALLBUS 2004 and Microcensus 2004. Comparing columns 1 and 2 with 3 and 4 it becomes apparent that a customary analysis of household income would be misleading without weighting. For instance, about $25 \%$ of the households in Mikrocensus 2004 and ALLBUS 2004 have an income of 2600 Euro or more. The same household income category applies more often to persons (over $30 \%$ ). On the other hand, a comparison of the columns 1 and 3 with 2 and 4 shows an agreeable degree of similarity between Microcensus and ALLBUS/GSS. Consequently, analyzing a sample of individuals on the household level without weighting will often show misleading results.

## Topics:

Acceptance of immigration, of ethnic minorities, and of Jews in Germany: attitude towards the influx of various groups of immigrants; attitudinal scale; contacts with foreigners within the family, at work, in the neighborhood, or among friends; perceived consequences of presence of foreigners in Germany; perception and evaluation of discriminatory behavior towards foreigners; assumed social evaluation statements on foreigners; ranking in terms of importance of different citizenship requirements; opinion on dual citizenship and on equality before the law for foreigners; support for the teaching of Islam in public schools; attitude towards ethnically mixed neighborhoods; estimation of proportion of foreigners in East and West Germany; living in neighborhoods with high percentage of foreigners; percentage of foreigners in local county (Kreis); local relationship between foreigners and Germans; perceived differences in lifestyle; indicators for social distance to ethnic minorities and foreigners; items on anti-Semitism; opinion of peers on foreigners.
3.) Citizenships and country of origin: first, second, and third citizenship of respondent and of spouse or partner; number of citizenships of respondent and of spouse or partner; original citizenship of respondent and of spouse or partner; country of origin of respondent and of respondent's parents and grandparents; country respondent lived in when young; length of residence in Germany.
4.) Self-assessment of personal characteristics: respondent investigates the qualifications of candidates in elections, sometimes feels resentful, is a good listener, sometimes "plays sick", takes advantage of others, is willing to admit mistakes, practices what s/he preaches, is always courteous, is irritated by people asking favors, has never deliberately hurt others (Marlowe-Crowne Social Desirability Scale).

## Note 0001

Split Questionnaire (CAPI/CASI)
This note concerns variable V3.
Since 2000, the ALLBUS-surveys have been conducted using the method of computer assisted interviewing (CAPI), i.e. the interviewer uses a laptop computer to read out the questions and to record the answers. With one notable exception, this was also the case for ALLBUS 2006. To survey the four items on on ethnocentrism in F017, a split questionnaire was used such that one half of the respondents answered the question in the usual CAPI-mode while the other half used the laptop computer to read and answer the questions on their own (CASI - computer assisted self-interviewing). By thus varying the degree of anonymity of the interview situation, the data can be used to test for social desirability effects in the respondents, answers on the topic of ethnocentrism.

Before proceeding with the rest of the interview, interviewers were asked to indicate whether respondents in the CASI-split really answered the questions on their own or if they required help from the interviewer. This information is provided in V47.

## Note 0002

Fair Share in Standard of Living?
This note concerns variable V20.
This variable has been recoded so as to conform with the standard ALLBUS coding. The sequence of answer categories shown in the data handbook therefore deviates from that actually used in the field.

Actual sequence of answer categories used in the field:

1. Fair share
2. More than fair share
3. Somewhat less
4. Very much less

## Note 0003

Inglehart-Index
This note concerns variable V144.
This index has been designed by Robert Inglehart to measure 'materialist' and 'postmaterialist' value orientations. It is based on the respondents' statements about their political priorities as given in V140 to V143.

Respondents who rank the items 'maintaining law and order in this country' and 'fighting rising prices' as the two most important issues are classified as 'materialists' while respondents who consider 'giving citizens more influence on government decisions' and 'protecting the right of free speech' as the two most important goals are categorized as 'postmaterialists'.

All other respondents show ambiguous priorities in terms of this index and are therefore classified as 'mixed types'. The number of categories for these 'mixed types' can vary. In V144 two such 'mixed types' are differentiated. Respondents who rank a 'postmaterialist, item first and a 'materialist' item second are grouped into the category 'postmaterialist mixed type' while the reverse order of preferences is classified as 'materialist mixed type'.

Finally, if a missing value occurs in one of the two political preferences relevant for index construction, the index is set to the corresponding missing value, as, in this case, it is impossible to construct the index according to its own logic.

Occupational Prestige Scale
This note concerns variables V193, V194, V224, V225, V271, V272, V315, V316, V341, V342, V358, V359, V719 and V720.

The occupational prestige scale is based on the ISCO classification of 1968 (comp. note 5).

The scores on this prestige scale are based on empirical data from social research in diverse countries. In each case respondents were asked to classify occupations according to their prestige or social esteem. These classifications were then used to construct a standardized scale of scores ranging between the hypothetical extreme values of 0 and 100.

As a rule, respondents are assigned prestige values according to their three-digit ISCO occupational categories. Whenever possible, undefinable and not classifiable cases (Code 1004) receive prestige values according to their occupational minor group. Cases which cannot be classified according to their occupational minor group receive the average prestige value of their occupational major group. Only the following categories from the occupational major group rest defined as 'missing':

## Note 0009

Magnitudeprestige Scale (MPS)
This note concerns variables V197, V198, V228, V229, V275, V276, V319, V320, V345, V346, V362, V363, V723 and V724.

The Magnitudeprestige Scale is based on an alternative measurement of social prestige created by Bernd Wegener. It is specifically modeled on the social context of the Federal Republic of Germany. While the Treiman scores are based on verbal judgments, the Magnitudeprestige Scale was constructed using a psychophysical measuring method. Unlike Treiman, who used prestige assessments based on a list of pre-quoted categories, Wegener relied on implicit ratio estimations of the relative magnitude of prestige. In two representative surveys (ZUMA-Bus 1979 and 1980), respondents were asked to consider 50 different occupations and to indicate their respective magnitude of social esteem by drawing lines of varying lengths. Using arithmetic transformations Wegener then constructed a standardized scale which describes a gradual mapping of social closure.

## Note 0012

The Goldthorpe Class Scheme
This note concerns variables V205, V236, V283, V327, V353, V370 and V731.

The class scheme by Goldthorpe groups individuals on the basis of their occupational position (reference number) and their occupational function (using ISCO 1968). By combining these two variables, 12 different class
categories are then constituted.
Please note that in contrast to earlier practice 'farmers on a cooperative farm' have been classified in a special category (12) since 1996. To make data from earlier ALBUS surveys compatible with this practice, simply recode all respondents who classify as 'farmer on a cooperative farm' in the occupational position variable (reference number 65) to code 12 in the corresponding Goldthorpe variable.

In contrast to an 'hierarchical' scale of social prestige or status, the Goldthorpe index reflects a concept of class structure based on employment relations. This makes the index especially useful in analyzing, for example, the development of industrial societies into service societies, because the categories of the Goldthorpe class scheme allow a more precise analysis and description of the growth or decline of different parts of the middle classes or of various groups of dependent employees and civil servants than scales which consist of horizontally differentiated ordinal status or prestige measures.

Moreover, the Goldthorpe class scheme in its present form was conceived with a view to internationally comparative analyses. Today, it is therefore widely used in comparative analyses of of social mobility.

The lowest income category 'Under 200 EURO' received the value 150 EURO, while the highest open category of ' 7500 EURO' was coded as 8750 EURO.

Variable V382 contains a categorization of the data in V381.

Household income
V439 (open question) and V440 (pre-quoted categories) are based on the information about the income of multiple-person households in V437 and V438. For one-person households, income data from V379 and V380 (respondent's income) was added, as the income of these households is identical with the respondent's income.

V441 is a proposal for the summary of the diverse information on household income. This variable integrates all the data gathered using open questions as well as lists of pre-quoted categories. For each of the listed categories the mid-point of class entered into the summary. The open categories at the beginning ('under 200 EURO') and the end ('7500 EURO and more') of the list were coded as 150 EURO and 8750 EURO respectively.

Split Questionnaire ISSP

The 2005 and 2006 modules of the "International Social Survey Programme" were fielded as part of the ALLBUS 2006 survey. Data collection for both modules therefore falls into 2006. By surveying ALLBUS and ISSP together, overall survey costs could be reduced and the ISSP modules were able to profit from the qualitatively superior sample of individuals regularly used for ALLBUS.

During the interviews, a split variable randomly assigned ALLBUS respondents to one of the two ISSP-modules so that each ISSP-questionnaire was completed by one half of the respondents participating in the ALLBUS interviews.

## Note 0021

## Metaclassification of Occupations

This note concerns variables V715 to V731.
For those respondents who are not in the labor force, the metaclassification of occupations allows an indirect occupational classification, e.g. according to the profession or occupation of the respondent's spouse or father. Thus, the purpose of the metaclassification is to arrive at a description of the social circumstance and social positions of otherwise unclassifiable respondents by (indirectly) linking them to positions in the occupational system in a principled way.

Pappi points out that there is probably more than one way of constructing a metaclassification of occupations (Pappi 1979: 297). As an alternative to Pappi's rather male-centered operationalization (e.g. married women are classified according to their husbands' occupation), Michael Terwey has developed a modified metaclassification scheme that gives more weight to women's direct social position (V582-V598). This more recent classification thus takes into account that in contemporary society it is more and more the individual's personal circumstance rather than his or her family's social capital that determines social position.

The construction of Terwey's metaclassification proceeds in the following steps:

1) All respondents who are employed full-time or part-time are classified according to their own current occupation.
2) All respondents who were formerly employed full-time or part-time are categorized according to their last occupational status.
3) Only those married women and men who themselves have never been employed before are classified according to their spouses" occupation. If the spouse is a pupil/student, a housewife/househusband or doing compulsory military/ alternative community service, classification is based on the father's occupation. For former ALLBUS-surveys the spouse's last occupation was used for categorization if the spouse was retired, unemployed or out of work for other reasons. As this information is not available since ALLBUS 1994, these cases are coded as not classifiable.
4) In previous ALLBUS-surveys, respondents who were widowed, divorced or living in separation and who had never been employed themselves were categorized according to their previous spouse's occupation. As this information is not available since ALLBUS 1994, these cases are coded as not classifiable.
5) All unmarried respondents who have never been employed themselves are categorized using their father's occupation.
6) Insofar as they cannot be considered full-time or parttime employed in the sense of this metaclassification, respondents in compulsory military or alternative community service and those in vocational training represent a general exception. For these and for all other respondents who have no identifiable main occupation, the nearest possible occupational position is used. Married respondents in this group are, for example, categorized according to their spouses' current occupation or, if this is impossible, according to their fathers' occupation.

If a missing value ('Refused', 'Don't know' or 'No answer') appears within an occupation code relevant for metaclassification or if, for any other reason, occupational information does not permit a metaclassification according to a main occupation, the case is also coded as not classifiable.

Unfortunately, it was impossible to implement Pappi's metaclassification of occupations with the data available in ALLBUS 2006 due to cuts in the ALLBUS-demography module (for more information on the cuts, please consult the Methodological Report for ALLBUS 1994).

Household Classification, Detailed;
Household Classification, Condensed;
Family Typology According to Porst (1984)
This note concerns variables V732 to V734.
Household and family structures are relevant subjects of empirical sociological research for political, sociological and methodological reasons (cf. Porst 1984).
Using an SPSS-program, suitable data has been extracted from the ALLBUS-household-demographics to form two household classifications, one detailed and one condensed, as well as a family typology (cf. Funk 1989). Together, these three typologies map the variety of family types and household compositions, thus forming a basis for further structural analysis.

The condensed household classification differentiates between one-person households, one- to four-generation-households, households of relatives with and without a family core - i.e. households with at least one member related to the others by kinship yet outside the line of descent - and between cohabiting communities with and without a family core. As relevant microstructures within these nine basic types of household, the detailed household classification distinguishes various combinations of kinship relations and the respondent's position within the context of the household (e.g. the detailed classification of households differentiates between married and cohabiting couples in one-generationhouseholds and between two-generation-households in which the respondent takes the role of child and those in which the respondent takes the role of parent).

As an extension of the household-classifications, the family typology identifies nuclear families, two- to four-generation-families (in all cases differentiating complete and incomplete families), extended families (i.e. households of relatives with a family core) and composite families (i.e. cohabiting communities with a family core).

## Note 0024

Weights for Analyses on Household Level
This note concerns variables V736 to V738.
As the ALLBUS-survey 2006 is based on a sample of individuals rather than households, the data has to be weighted for analyses concerning attributes of households in order to adjust for the over-representation of large households due to the survey design. For analyses treating East and West Germany separately, the appropriate transformation weight is V736. Analyses of data on total Germany should be performed using the transformation weight in V738, which additionally adjusts for the oversample of East German respondents. (The weight in V738 is calculated as the product of the transformation weight in V736 and the household-1evel design weight in V737, which adjusts for the oversample of East German respondents.)

Missing values in V736 and V738 result from insufficient data on the number and age of persons living in the same household as the respondent.

## Note 0025

Political Size of Municipality and BIK-Type of Municipality
This note concerns variables V740 and V741.
Size of Municipality (V740) categorizes the respondent's place of residence according to its number of inhabitants. For reasons of data protection uncategorized data of this kind cannot be published. Categorization of the respondent's place of residence is based on information about its size as a political or administrative unit.

Because political or administrative units in many cases do not provide an accurate description of the type of community in which a respondent actually lives (allowing no differentiation between small rural and suburban communities, for example), supplementary regional variables were introduced into the ALLBUS program.

As of 2002, ALLBUS uses the updated BIK-Regions (V741) by 'BIK-Institut Aschpurwis + Behrens', which, for the first time, provide a taxonomy of regions based on a uniform set of data for both East and West Germany. Similar to the 'Boustedt-type of Municipality', classification is primarily based on the number of residents of a given urban region. The BIK-Regions classification, however, additionally takes into account the catchment area of an urban core by factoring in information about the quota of commuters from the surrounding area. All in all four different types of region are distinguished: core areas, conurbation areas, transitional areas and peripheral areas. Thus, catchment areas of large cities are identifiable down to community level. Only communities that do not belong to any of the four types of region are classified according to the political size of municipality’.

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## Appendix

## Notes on the Additional ALLBUS / GGSScompact 2006 (ZA No. 4503)

As an alternative to ALLBUS / GGSS 2006 with its relatively complex demography module, ZA also offers an additional compact version with a reduced number of demographic variables. Providing an easily manageable selection of basic demographic descriptors, this ALLBUS / GGSScompact addresses, amongst others, the needs of newcomers to data analysis. Moreover, access conditions for ALLBUS / GGSScompact are less strict than for the more extensive ALLBUS / GGSS data, because data protection issues become less salient.

Nevertheless, remaining data protection issues required changes in certain sensitive variables. When part of the ALLBUS / GGSS survey in question, detailed data concerning the respondents' citizenship was dichotomized ("German citizenship" vs. "No German citizenship"). The information on the respondents' occupational position was recoded into more inclusive categories. Finally, the two largest categories of the variable 'Political Size of Municipality' were combined. (A detailed account of recodings follows on page A3.)

Apart from demography, all other questions have been retained completely in the compact version. Moreover, variable labels and variable numbers in ALLBUS / GGSScompact are the same as in the unabridged ALLBUS / GGSS data set. In this way, users may easily move between both versions of the ALLBUS / GGSS data if necessary.
