GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

Content to be coded (from sample dates as decided for each country)

- a) All party broadcasts
- b) Special programmes, documentaries, discussions, debates, press conferences, phone-ins, dealing with:
- Europe, European Community, European integration/unity
 - European ^(EC) institutions
 - European elections
 - [- European culture and way of life]

c) News and current affairs programmes on the above themes

d) News and current affairs programmes dealing with political and economic aspects of other member countries.

This coding is to be taken only to (and including) item level.

(Ireland and Luxemburg can apply their own, more narrow, criteria for the inclusion of material on neighbouring countries.)

e) All other programmes made especially with the European elections in mind

Note. According to these specifications, we exclude entertainment, television programmes formally identified as 'educational' and spot advertisements.

Levels of analysis

a) Programme

A programme refers to the division of output used and publicised by the broadcasting organisation. Each programme is identified by a unique title (which is in several cases the title of a periodical or serial programme).

b) Item

The item is a typical sub-unit within news and current affairs programmes. It is defined by a specific event or topic. An item is, in journalistic terms, a news story, a report, a feature, an editorial, an advertisement etc.

In most cases, an item is clearly marked by a change of event/topic and by some kind of break and also by a change of presentation or format. In doubtful cases (where for instance some event/topic is presented in several different formats or locations) the continuity in terms of semantic meaning should be the principal criterion for distinguishing the item boundary. If there are no clear indicators for subdivision, programme and item are identical.

c) Communicator sequence (unit of analysis)

The basic unit of analysis (corresponding to a 'case' in the data-technical sense) is a continuous sequence of television time marked by the uninterrupted appearance of a single communicator or source. The sequence, and hence the unit, is initiated by such a communicator and completed by the start of another sequence from another source or by the end of the item. The communicator is identified by type and characterised in other ways as indicated in the coding schedule.

Programme sequences which have no identifiable communicator (e.g. titles, introductory themes, headlines of news) or which, although having a communicator, contain no intelligible information (connecting remarks, incomplete sentences, interjections etc.) can be neglected.

References within units

There are two main kinds of references to be treated within each unit: to relevant persons or objects and to themes.

a) Reference persons or objects

Persons quoted, referred to, or mentioned without interrupting the communication sequence are identified by the same variable of type as used for the communicator who initiates the sequence. Other variables which apply are indicated in the schedule.

Relevant references to objects (institutions, organisations, groups) are treated in the same way, with some adaptation of the variables that apply to persons.

b) Themes

The theme is a way of expressing the semantic content of the unit. In most cases it is the topic or subject to which the communicator refers, but it also includes relevant ideological or evaluative statements. References must be clear and unambiguous, but need not be extended. Thus a list of important questions, issues, or topics named by a communicator will give rise to several entries under 'themes'. Only those topics for which a theme category is provided should be coded, but a topic which is clearly relevant but does not fit any of the verbal forms given can be coded for a given unit.

Each of the theme categories, including the 'other' category, can be differentiated or specified, if this seems appropriate, to take account of special aspects of the national campaign. Codes for these specifications have to be set up by each country on its own, using the variable SUBTHE1-12. This variable will not be used for cross-national comparative purposes.

Coding format

Each unit of analysis (see definition above) must be identifiable by a unique code number which is a combination of a programme, item and unit serial number. All items and units within one programme have the same programme characteristics, and all units within one item have the same item characteristics.

For some variables the codes have to be allocated according to own country's circumstances or interests. This is indicated by an asterisk (*) attached to the variable name. Variables are also marked by an asterisk if free codes can be added to the value list.

Missing values

Define codes for missing values at own choice. The codes '0' and 'blank' can be used for this purpose, for many variables the code '9' and combinations thereof are also available.
